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
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Preach the Word!

In admonishing Timothy to "Preach the word!" the apostle Paul provides a pattern for how preachers, teachers, elders, and those who write on biblical themes should approach their work.

Few passages set forth the duties of a Christian preacher/teacher more clearly than 2 Timothy 4:2 which says,

Preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort, with great patience and instruction (NASB).

Preach the Word

Preach the word (Most versions); Proclaim the message (NEB). The Greek word kērussō, rendered "preach," means "(1) to make an official announcement, announce, make known, by an official herald or one who functions as such; (2) to make public declarations, proclaim aloud" (BDAG).

Faithful preachers/teachers proclaim the gospel. God's saving message may seem foolish to the world, but it is His power to save (1 Cor. 1:18-21). We must not promote human traditions, the commandments of men, empty speculation, the doctrine of devils, etc. Like the apostle Paul, let us promote nothing but the word of God (1 Cor. 2:1-5), knowing that the inspired Scriptures are profitable for all things (2 Tim. 3:16-17). Jesus is the Incarnate Word, the Logos (John 1:1, 14). Faithful preachers/teachers proclaim the inspired message without any alteration (1 Tim. 4:6; 2 Tim. 1:13; 2:15).

Be Ready

Be instant (KJV); Be ready (NKJV, NASB, ESV); Be urgent (ASV, RSV); Press it home (NEB). The Greek word *ephistēmi*, rendered "be ready," means "to be present in readiness to discharge a task, fix one's mind on" (BDAG).

Faithful preachers/teachers are prepared to offer a reasoned defense of their faith (1 Pet. 3:14-15). The gospel message involves issues of life and death. Eternity hangs in the balance. As Paul was eager to preach the gospel to those who lived in Rome (Rom. 1:15), we should willingly serve the spiritual needs of others. Saints in Macedonia showed similar evangelistic zeal (1 Thess. 1:6-8).

In Season

In season (Most Versions); On all occasions, convenient or inconvenient (NEB). The Greek word eukairōs, rendered "in season," is descriptive of action that is done "conveniently" (BDAG).

At times, fields are white unto harvest (John 4:35-38; Matt. 9:37-38). As wicked men and the devil himself look for opportunities to advance their cause (Mark 14:11; 1 Pet. 5:8), we must be ready to act when opportunities arise (Gal. 6:10). Although He was weary, Jesus took time to teach the Samaritan woman who had come to draw water from Jacob's well (John 4:5-10). May we redeem the time, making the most of the opportunity (Eph. 5:15-16; Col. 4:5).

Out of Season

Out of season (Most Versions); On all occasions, convenient or inconvenient (NEB). The Greek word akairōs, rendered "out of season," refers to that which is "untimely, in a play on words, 'in season, out of season,' i.e., whether or not the preaching comes at a convenient time for the hearers" (BDAG).

Sometimes God's word falls into good ground, and sometimes it lands upon the wayside (Luke 8:5-8). Some are open-minded; others are closed-minded (2 Cor. 4:3-4). Faithful preachers/teachers proclaim the message regardless of the circumstances. Noah preached for 120 years, but his warnings fell on deaf ears (1 Pet. 3:20; 2 Pet. 2:5). While Noah only saved his own family, that was still a notable accomplishment (Heb. 11:7).

Elijah also lived in a difficult time. Fleeing from Queen Jezebel, the prophet was so discouraged that he said, "Let me die..." (1 Kings 19:4). Despairing, Elijah said, "I alone am left..." (1 Kings 19:10). However, his bleak assessment was inaccurate (1 Kings 19:18). Afterward, God encouraged Elijah, blessing him with renewed strength and purpose (1 Kings 19:15).

Jesus did not give up because many rejected His message. After emphasizing the spiritual nature of His ministry and the true cost of discipleship, many departed and walked with Him no more (John 6:24-27, 66). Nevertheless, Jesus was comforted in the fact that Peter and the other apostles appreciated what He had to offer (John 6:67-69).

Where would we be if our Lord had become discouraged and quit? Bible class teachers, preachers, brethren, mothers and fathers, teenagers: *Don't quit!* (Prov. 24:10; 2 Cor. 4:1-2; Heb. 12:1-3). Our faith will be tested.

Troublesome times will come. Let us faithfully uphold the truth in season and out of season. Regardless of how bleak circumstances may appear, remember that God's cause will be victorious in the end. Live by the motto, "It's too soon to quit!"

Reprove

Reprove (KJV, ASV, NASB, ESV); Convince (NKJV, RSV); Use argument (NEB). The Greek word *elegchō*, rendered "reprove," means "(1) to scrutinize or examine carefully, bring to light, expose, set forth; (2) to bring a person to the point of recognizing wrongdoing, convict, convince someone of something, point something out to someone; (3) to express strong disapproval of someone's action, reprove, correct..." (BDAG).

Faithful preachers/teachers must convict their hearers. Spiritual growth is only possible if we are dissatisfied with our present state. Believers must be convicted of the truth of the gospel; sinners should come to recognize their alienated and lost condition, and respond obediently.

False teachers use flattery and cater to the pride of their listeners, pampering, pandering and placating. Such is not true of gospel preachers. A student of Socrates once said to his master, "Socrates, I hate you, because every time I meet you, you make me see what I am" (Barclay, 205). This is the essence of gospel preaching. The first thing a Christian teacher must do is to make a man see himself as he is.

Administering scriptural rebukes is required of saints living in a sinful world. John the Baptist courageously rebuked Herod for all the evils which he had done (Luke 3:19-20). The inspired revelation of the Spirit rebukes the world of sin (John 16:8). Saints must have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness,

but rather must expose them (Eph. 5:11-13). This is the responsibility of all disciples (Matt. 18:15-17), but especially elders and evangelists (Titus 1:9, 12-13; 2:15). When administered without partiality (1 Tim. 5:19-20), rebukes serve as expressions of love (Heb. 12:5-6; Rev. 3:19).

Rebuke

Rebuke (Most Versions); Use reproof (NEB). The Greek word epitimaō, rendered "rebuke," in this context means "to express strong disapproval of someone, rebuke, reprove, censure also speak seriously, warn in order to prevent an action or bring one to an end..." (BDAG).

The word occurs in the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, with but two exceptions (2 Tim. 4:2; Jude 9). Jesus demonstrated His miraculous power by rebuking sickness and disease (Luke 4:39-40), evil spirits (Luke 4:35, 41), and the forces of nature (Luke 8:23-24). When necessary, He also rebuked the disciples. He chastised James and John because they wished to call down fire from heaven to consume a village of the Samaritans (Luke 9:51-56). When Peter upbraided the Lord for saying that He would be crucified, Jesus strongly rebuked him, saying, "Get behind Me, Satan" (Mark 8:31-33).

Faithful preachers/teachers must rebuke with utter fearlessness. Why? Warnings and rebukes can save a brother or sister from spiritual shipwreck (Jas. 5:19-20). Such words must always be spoken in love and with a consciousness of our common guilt. Hypocritical judgments do not further the kingdom of God. Before we can help a brother who is struggling with sin, we must first remove the beam from our eye. Yet, when the need arises, let us utter words of warning (Matt. 7:1-5).

Followers of Jesus Christ must have the courage to rebuke sin. The Lord said, "Be on your guard! If your

brother sins, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him" (Luke 17:3). However, let us not sin in the process of rebuking sin; rather, rebukes must be administered in a respectful and dignified manner (Jude 9-10).

Exhort

Exhort (KJV, NKJV, ASV, NASB, RSV, ESV); Appeal (NEB). The Greek word parakaleō, rendered "exhort," means "(1) to ask to come and be present where the speaker is, call to one's side; (2) to urge strongly, appeal to, urge, exhort, encourage..." (BDAG). Faithful preachers/teachers not only rebuke but also exhort. Censure must not be expressed in such a way as to drive men to despair. Our message should appeal to man's heart and hope. All need encouragement.

The preaching of John the Baptist (Luke 3:15-18), the apostle Peter (Acts 2:40-41), Barnabas, the Son of Encouragement (Acts 4:36-37; 11:22-23), and Paul (Acts 14:21-22; 20:1-2) all expressed words of exhortation. Such should be given in a spirit of fatherly concern (1 Thess. 2:10-12).

Exhortation goes hand in hand with the work of convicting and rebuking. Overseers must hold fast to the faithful word, which is in accordance with the teaching so that they will be able both to exhort (parakaleō) in sound doctrine and to refute (elegchō) those who contradict (Titus 1:9). Faithful evangelists will heed the admonition given to Titus: "These things speak and exhort (parakaleō) and reprove (elegchō) with all authority. Let no one disregard you" (Titus 2:15).

"With Great Patience

With all longsuffering (KJV, NKJV, ASV); With great patience (NASB); Be unfailing in patience (RSV); With complete patience (ESV); With all the patience that the work of teaching requires (NEB). The Greek word makrothumia, rendered "patience,"

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Our Everlasting Home

By revealing the consistency between the covenants regarding the afterlife, Kyle exposes the error of annihilationists who often claim that the Old Testament says nothing about life after death.

The growth of a purely naturalistic and materialistic understanding of human nature has a profound influence on how people respond to the gospel. Paul expressed this problem in his time, writing, "If the dead do not rise, 'Let us eat and drink, for tomorrow we die!'" (1 Cor. 15:32, NKJV). If we are nothing more than the molecules and chemicals that make up our bodies when we die, that ends our existence. Yet, the Bible teaches something much different.

The Parable of the Unjust Steward

Consider what is said in the very challenging and unusual parable of the Unjust Steward. Jesus tells us about a steward who is about to be dismissed because of accusations that he had been wasting his master's goods. To ensure that he would have prospective employers when he is dismissed, he quickly negotiates with his master's debtors to lower their bills (Luke 16:1-7). Jesus ends the parable with the master's reaction and a practical application:

So the master commended the unjust steward because he had dealt shrewdly. For the sons of this world are more shrewd in their generation than the sons of light. And I say to you, make friends for yourselves by unrighteous mammon, that when you fail, they may receive you into an everlasting home (Luke 16:8-9).

Jesus is not teaching dishonesty. He is not teaching the mishandling of things entrusted to us. Rather, He is talking about preparation. Just as the steward recognized that he had to do something to prepare for his future. Jesus wants to teach His disciples to make the same application in their own lives. The Christian must interact with and use the things of this world—i.e., "unrighteous mammon," in ways that will consider the limits of their benefit to us. In other words, we must live now in ways that will prepare the way for us into an "everlasting home" that will be desirable. One point is clear: life in the age to come, whether in condemnation or heaven will be our "everlasting home."

The Ending of Ecclesiastes

We find this same idea in the Old Testament. As the Preacher of Ecclesiastes, who was likely Solomon (Eccl. 1:1), brings the book to an end, he writes:

Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth, before the difficult days come, and the years draw near when you say, "I have no pleasure in them": while the sun and the light, the moon and the stars, are not darkened, and the clouds do not return after the rain; in the day when the keepers of the house tremble, and the strong men bow down; when the grinders cease because they are few, and those that look through the windows grow dim; when the doors are shut in the streets, and the sound of grinding is low; when one rises up at the sound of a bird, and all the daughters of music are

brought low; also they are afraid of height, and of terrors in the way; when the almond tree blossoms, the grasshopper is a burden, and desire fails. For man goes to his eternal home, and the mourners go about the streets (Eccl. 12:1-5).

Annihilationists have often claimed that the Old Testament says nothing about life after death, or heaven and hell. If that was true, how could the Preacher of Ecclesiastes speak of a man going "to his eternal home"? If death is the end, he might speak of it as an "eternal resting place," or even an "eternal end," but why speak of it as a "home" (or literally, a "house") if it is an extinction? Clearly, we are going somewhere and will live there eternally.

Hope to Live in "the House of the Lord"

There is a similar concept expressed in the Old Testament that further reveals this hope on the part of God's faithful people for a home with God after this life. We see it in two psalms. The first is identified in the Hebrew text as "A Psalm of David" (Ps. 27:1a). David praises the Lord as the "strength" of his life (Ps. 27:1c) and praises Him for the deliverance He has granted him from his enemies (Ps. 27:2-3). He then states:

One thing I have desired of the LORD, that will I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the LORD, and to inquire in His temple. For in the time of trouble He shall hide me in His pavilion; in the secret

place of His tabernacle He shall hide me; He shall set me high upon a rock. And now my head shall be lifted up above my enemies all around me; therefore I will offer sacrifices of joy in His tabernacle; I will sing, yes, I will sing praises to the LORD (Ps. 27:4-6).

Of what is David speaking? Remember, David was not a priest or a Levite, so some access to the physical sanctuary of God was not even available to him. Further, the "temple" had not yet been constructed, so to what "house" or "temple" is he even referring? He speaks of this as something he wants "all the days of his life," but remember how he put it in Psalm 23:6—"Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever." David equates "all the days" of his life with something that involves dwelling with the Lord "forever." He speaks of a home with God beyond this life.

The same is seen in a psalm attributed in the Hebrew text to the "sons of Korah" (Ps. 84:1a). It reads:


How lovely is Your tabernacle, O LORD of hosts! My soul longs, yes, even faints for the courts of the LORD; My heart and my flesh cry out for the living God. Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young—even Your altars, O LORD of hosts, my King and my God. Blessed are those who dwell in Your house; they will still be praising You. Selah (Ps. 84:1b-4).

Like David, this psalm looks beyond the earthly tabernacle and reflects a recognition that it was only a "copy and shadow of the heavenly things" (Heb. 8:5). This psalm, to be sung among the people, aspires to a time when God's faithful can dwell in His house, not on this earth, but in an eternal home with God. As Christians, that home with God should also be our aspiration—a time and place when, "the tabernacle of God is with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people. God Himself will be with them and be their God" (Rev. 21:3). Where will your "everlasting home" be?

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Teaching Our Children: The Principle of the Lesson (Part V)

The more effort we put into proper study and construction of our lessons, the more everything else involved in teaching falls into place.

In February's article, we looked at one aspect of the Law of the Lesson ("The truth to be taught must be learned through truth already known."), and that was: a lifetime of learning requires that foundations be laid upon what is already known. Who God is and what He has done is the most important foundation. This is where God's word begins: this is what He wants us to hear.

The lifetime of learning begins with one lesson at a time, which brings us to the other aspect of the law. How can this principle guide us as teachers in the construction of the individual lesson? How do we formulate our lessons so that they effectively lay the proper foundations of who God is as found in His word?

Constructing a lesson used to be my least favorite part. I wanted to get on with the business of decorating the classroom, finding the liveliest visual, and providing the perfect handout. A study of these laws completely transformed my tendency to prioritize decorating and my perception of my role before the children. I was not the performer; the students were. Getting that straight brought fringe benefits as well. Burnout became a thing of the past; the children evidenced better behavior, and their thinking skills began to develop. What seemed to be burdensome before was all working out smoothly. Why? Because the principles of the mind were all employed, not the principle that I must do all the work.

Here is the plan I use when constructing my lessons. As I read the Bible Scriptures, I write down the answers to these six questions about the text: Who? When? Where? What? Why? and Wherefore? (or Therefore?). This is not a new method; journalists use it all the time. For every story they gather, they're looking for the Who, the When, the Where, the What, the Why, and the Wherefore. It's where they get their detail; it's how they get our attention.

When it comes to teaching our children the word of God, we can't afford to leave out any of the details. Class attention will improve as you become a better narrator; you will become a better narrator because you will strengthen your observation skills.

Maybe you have tried this method, but grown tired of it. I know that I have. I've cut corners and rushed a lesson without seeking out the hidden nuggets, and it never fails: my lesson comes across as tired, and student attention tends to wander.

After I mentioned this technique in one of my lectures, stressing that even the teacher of the smallest children can benefit from it, I received this feedback from a young mother and teacher who had attended:

I was in the middle of teaching the 1-2-year-olds when we came to the lectures, so on the way home, I redid my lesson plan using your techniques instead of mine. It worked so well. I was doing Ezra and Nehemiah and was really stumped as to how to teach it to such a young age.

I think the reason people rush to the workroom for ideas first is because they are so afraid of messing it up and won't try things on their own. The real nitty-gritty on how to write your lesson was the most helpful of your lecture.

Heading to the workroom first is not what will make our teaching "right" but gathering the facts from the text will. You will soon have more ideas than you know what to do with. The Who will help you pin down proper visuals to tell the story; Where will generate maps, When will make sure you have a timeline and keep the bigger picture always before the children; What will open up more ideas than you can handle to decorate your room with themes and drills; Why and Wherefore will help you guide the (older) students in proper thinking on the things of God.

This method helps you study the text and get "the truth to be taught" in your mind and heart. In facing the children, you will know exactly what they need to hear to build on "the truths already known." You'll be able to handle unexpected questions and situations and to recover when attentions are lost. The children notice a well-prepared and astute teacher, and they will positively respond to them.

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The Sermon on the Mount: The Golden Rule

David explores the meaning of the Golden Rule: "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets" (Matt. 7:12).

In case anyone had the mistaken impression that Jesus was excluding certain people from the kingdom, He says,

Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened. Or which one of you, if his son asks him for bread, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a serpent? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him! (Matt. 7:7-11).

Yes, some people are like dogs and pigs in how they react to the gospel; yet, anyone who asks, seeks, and knocks can come to the kingdom. Anyone who wants to come to the kingdom is welcomed with opened arms. Like a father who cares for his children, our heavenly Father knows how to provide for us beyond our comprehension. Regardless of who we are or what we have done, if we so desire, we can become part of God's family.

What Is the Point?

In this last third of Jesus' sermon, He warns us regarding passing judgment without mercy, identifies the potential rejection of the gospel by some, and gives a promise of the kingdom to

those who genuinely want to become citizens. Each of these instructions represents actual scenarios in which we will likely find ourselves. There will be times when we need to engage those who are in sin. There will be times when we will encounter people who reject the gospel. There will be times when we will find people who are genuinely seeking the kingdom.

Nevertheless, how are we to approach people in these and other likely situations? Jesus simply says we are to treat others in the fashion we would want to be treated. The implementation of this fundamental principle is key to our ability to reflect the glory of God into the lives of those who do not know God.

The Heart of It All

Jesus explains how this principle is the foundation of the Law and Prophets. In other words, this is the foundation on which the entire system of belief and practice rested. There has never been such a short, yet, profound commentary on the Old Testament. Yes, the Law and Prophets often cited this principle as the reason for a specific command. Consider the following passages:

You shall do no injustice in court.
You shall not be partial to the
poor or defer to the great, but in
righteousness shall you judge your
neighbor. You shall not go around as
a slanderer among your people, and

you shall not stand up against the life of your neighbor: I am the LORD. You shall not hate your brother in your heart, but you shall reason frankly with your neighbor, lest you incur sin because of him. You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against the sons of your own people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the LORD (Lev. 19:15-18).

When a stranger sojourns with you in your land, you shall not do him wrong. You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the LORD your God (Lev. 19:33-34).

Thus says the LORD: "Let not the wise man boast in his wisdom, let not the mighty man boast in his might, let not the rich man boast in his riches, but let him who boasts boast in this, that he understands and knows me, that I am the LORD who practices steadfast love, justice, and righteousness in the earth. For in these things I delight, declares the LORD" (Jer. 9:23-24).

What shall I do with you, O Ephraim? What shall I do with you, O Judah? Your love is like a morning cloud, like the dew that goes early away. Therefore I have hewn them by the prophets; I have slain them by the words of my mouth, and my judgment goes forth as the light. For I desire steadfast love and not sacrifice, the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings (Hos. 6:4-6).

Each of these passages from the Law and Prophets highlights love as being the moral and ethical foundation of Israel's relationship with Jehovah. A lawyer once asked Jesus about how to inherit eternal life and how to define one's neighbor (Luke 10:24-34). This familiar exchange is where Jesus teaches the parable of the good Samaritan. As far as the Lord was concerned, there was more to the Law and Prophets than just commandment keeping.

The Law and Prophets demanded mercy to be extended to our fellow man. If this self-righteous lawyer were beaten and robbed on the road to Jericho, a likely occurrence on that road, how would he want to be treated? Would he want to be ignored as did the priest and Levite who passed by on the other side? Or, would he want to be cared for as the Samaritan cared for the injured man? In this context, the answer is obvious. He, and anyone for that matter, would want to be treated mercifully. This being the case, we are to be merciful to our fellow man.

While Jesus says this rule is the foundation of the Law and Prophets, He was doing more than simply giving commentary on the Old Law. This rule, or the breaking of it, reflects the motive of our heart. It is to be the driving force for how we live and interact with other people. In essence, Jesus is telling us how to be human: how to bear the image of God in the world and reflect His glory.

Simple, Profound, and Transforming

The Golden Rule is simple. We teach this precept to our children as a moral north-star. The Golden Rule is profound due to the transforming consequence of its implementation. This rule makes everything about life in this world better. This rule enables us to fulfill the purpose for which God has created us.

To see how much the Golden Rule could improve our lives, we could apply it to the situations which Jesus has already considered in this sermon. For example, how would we want to be treated if we were living in sin (Matt. 7:1-5)? Would we want someone to humiliate us publicly? Would we want to be used as a punch line? Would we want someone to kick us if we were down? Of course. not. We would want someone to help us. With love and understanding, we would want someone to reason with us. Therefore, we are to treat those struggling in sin in the same manner that we would want to be treated.

How would we want to be treated if we were adamantly opposed to everything sacred and holy (Matt. 7:6)? We probably would want to be left alone. Jesus said not to give what is holy to the dogs or to cast our pearls before swine. When we find someone hostile to the gospel, leave him alone. If he has a change of heart, he will know where to go for help. There is no benefit in wasting time and energy by arguing or giving someone hostile more reason to be hostile. As strange as this scenario may sound, treat such people how you would want to be treated.

How would we want to be treated if we were anxiously searching for the kingdom (Matt. 7:7-11)? If we were asking, seeking, and knocking, how would we want to be treated? Would we not want someone to answer, guide, and open the door? We would want someone to take time to teach us. We would want someone to answer our questions or calm our reservations patiently. If this is true, then treat honest seekers of the kingdom in the manner that you would want to be treated.

The Sermon on the Mount and Beyond

Of course, the Golden Rule has more application beyond the immediate context of this sermon. For example, consider how this rule has the potential to transform marriages. Paul inserted this principle when he described the relationship between a husband and wife. He wrote that husbands were to love their wives as they love themselves. Husbands were to treat their wives as they would want to be treated: "In the same way husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it..." (Eph. 5:28-29). Marriages struggle and fail when the Golden Rule is ignored. In contrast, our marriages reflect the glory of God when the Golden Rule is practiced.

Also, the Golden Rule has the potential to transform those in positions of leadership. Leaders most definitely impact the lives and well-being of other people. Whether someone is an owner of a company, a supervisor at work, a high school coach, or an elder in a church, the Golden Rule must be the guiding principle of how leadership is approached.

Few leaders today have the Golden Rule as their foundation. Instead, pride and selfishness govern decision-making processes. Many leaders consider pride and selfishness to be perks of the job. Maybe they experienced mistreatment by someone who was once over them, and now they feel it is their turn to get theirs. This view of leadership has no place in the kingdom of God.

Jesus rebuked James and John for thinking this was how they could use leadership. The Romans might have ruled by pride and selfishness, but it would not be so in God's kingdom (Mark 10:42-45). Rather, self-giving love was to be employed. Qualities of empathy, understanding, and consideration should be adopted. These are the hallmarks of a certain leadership style: servant leadership. Ultimately, the Golden Rule produces such leadership qualities. We need to look no further than Jesus to see servant leadership in self-giving motion.

Conclusion

Too often, pride and selfishness blind us from seeing and experiencing

the transforming love of God. The Golden Rule is a strange and unusual way of living in the eyes of the world. Perhaps, we do not trust this rule, or we doubt the way of life that Jesus is describing. If such is the case, may the Lord increase our faith.

Remember the warning at the beginning of this chapter: "For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and with the measure you use it will be measured to you" (Matt. 7:2). In the end, Jesus has promised to judge us according to

how we treated other people. Those who practice judgment without mercy will be judged without mercy. If we want to become the light of the world and salt of the earth, we must adopt the Golden Rule into our hearts.

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
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A Tribute to My Grandmother

Sister Thelma Lee Mercer has gone to her eternal reward. Her grandson, Dale, recalls the godly influence that she exerted for so many years.

Thelma Lea Mercer, my grandmother, passed away on March 28, 2019, at the age of ninety-six. Her steady influence over the years impacted countless lives. She was a devoted wife, a loving mother and grandmother, a hard worker, and a homemaker. She was a cookie baker, a giver of hugs, a birthday card sender, an encourager, and a gardener. However, in spending time with her, you would soon find that her

excellence in all these things flowed from something deeper and more profound. My grandmother was, above all else, a woman of faith in God.

Psalm 119 was written by one with a deep and sincere love for God, and by extension, a profound love for His word and instruction. Throughout the psalm, the author declares his love for God's word, and affirms that to study Sacred Scripture is not wearisome.

Instead, it is refreshment, joy, and nourishment. My grandmother embodied this attitude toward God and His word.

With my whole heart I seek you; let me not wander from your commandments! I have stored up your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you. Blessed are you, O LORD; teach me your statutes! With my lips I declare all the rules of your mouth. In the way of your testimonies I delight as much as in all riches. I will meditate on your precepts and fix my eyes on your ways. I will delight in your statutes; I will not forget your word (Ps. 119:10-16, ESV).

In verse 10, the writer expresses his choice to seek God and His desire to live righteously. My grandmother converted to Christ at age eighteen. She gave herself wholly to God. She was a faithful member of the Robison Street church of Christ in Edna, TX for over seventy-five years. Like a rock that the storm beats against, she was unwavering in her devotion to God. She pursued holiness and took great care to assure that all she did was pleasing to God. From her speech, to her worship, to even doing her taxes, in every action, her greatest desire was to serve and glorify God.

The author speaks in verse 11 of filling his heart with God's word and how this is a remedy against sin. My grandmother was an exemplification of this verse. Jesus said, "The good person out of the good treasure of his heart produces good, and the evil person out of his evil treasure produces evil. for out of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks" (Luke 6:45). My grandmother spent years diligently studying the Lord's teachings and storing up good treasure. It showed in the way she lived and the way she spoke. She carried the Bible with her, written on her heart.

Verse 12 begins with praise to God and ends with a request to be taught His statutes. My grandmother's focus was on God and His word. She sought His teachings on every biblical subject, not the opinions of men. Once she invited me to her home to give me some books to help with my preaching. As she went through her small bookcase, she examined each book



and set some reference books to the side for me. She came to a collection of sermons and put it to the other side saying, "I don't care anything about giving you that. You'll be studying and writing your own sermons." I'm sure there was nothing wrong with the sermon outline book. Yet, this is a prime example of her belief in the need to go to the Bible for our teaching and authority and not to lean on men.

In verse 13, the author states his practice of telling others of God's word. Any conversation with my grandmother would inevitably turn to biblical subjects. My grandmother loved to talk about God and the Bible, freely sharing her knowledge and wisdom. She was equally quick to share biblical truth with someone she just met as to discuss a sermon point with a preacher. She taught her sons the truth and lived to see two of them serve as elders in the church. My youngest uncle fondly remembers how she read him a psalm every night at bedtime when he was a young boy. The Lord's word was always on her tongue.

The writer speaks in verse 14 of valuing the teaching of God more than riches. My grandmother grew up poor, but lived to see times of financial ease. She was frugal and a good steward of all her blessings. While many fall into the trap of becoming servants to their money and things, she never allowed these to become her focus. She treated her financial blessings as tools to be used in the service of God. She was prompt and generous in helping those in need, in supporting gospel preaching, and in supporting her local congregation. Quietly and without pretension, she helped everywhere she could.

Verse 15 is an expression of the author's intention to meditate and focus on the Lord's instruction. Bible study was not an occasional fancy for my grandmother. Her Bible and concordance were always out and used diligently. She spent many hours in study, especially in her later years. She

thought and studied deeply and mined the Scriptures for all they had to offer. She truly set her mind on things above.

In verse 16, the writer expresses his joy in the word and says he will never forget it. The Bible was a joy to my grandmother. She loved the Scriptures and loved to study. She once told me she was so thankful that God allowed her to live for so long and gave her time to learn so much and come to such a deep understanding of His word. She did not forget His word. She was steadfast in her study and her love for the truth right to the end.

My eyes shed streams of tears, because people do not keep your law (Ps. 119:136, ESV).

Verse 136 expresses the writer's sorrow due to others' disobedience. My grandmother's Christianity was not a selfish pursuit. She cared deeply for the lost. Her heartfelt concern was that so many needed the gospel and needed someone to preach it to them. She was joyfully tearful in encouraging me in preaching and always asked if I had preached lately and intended to continue. She truly wanted everyone to be saved.

In her last days, she woke up for a time to visit with one of her sons. Before going back to sleep, she prayed a short prayer, asking God to forgive her if she had offended anyone or if she had done anything to keep someone from obeying the gospel, and also asked God to please hurry and take her home. Her dedication to God's service and her confidence in her hope were inspirational to many. She is now gone on to her reward and will be sorely missed.

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

QUESTION:

Is It Wrong to Use an Instrumental Tune in a Church Video?

Answer:

Recently, I was asked, "Where is the passage which includes a command, example, or necessary inference for using a secular instrumental tune as background on a congregation's introductory video on its website?" (I might add that I added the word "secular" after viewing the different videos mentioned in the note accompanying the question. In no case did I hear any spiritual song set to instrumental music, BLG.)

Since Christians wonder about such matters, because they understand there is no authority for using instrumental music in worship, it seems wise to give some attention to this question.

It is needful to remember that there are two types of Bible authority: generic and specific. When a passage includes a command, an approved example, or a necessary inference to the effect that we must obey the directive in that way and that way alone, because of no other passages telling us another way to perform the Lord's will, then specific authority is involved. God's instruction to Noah specified what he was to build and the kind of wood he should use (Gen. 6:14), Noah had no alternative in either matter, and he received divine commendation for obeying (Gen. 6:22). He could not build a rowboat, and he could use no other kind of wood than gopher wood. Likewise in the Lord's supper, the only day specified is the

first day of the week, and the kind of meal to be eaten is specified as a memorial meal (Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 11:25).

The other type of authority, generic, simply involves a directive to do something without accompanying information about how we must do it. Jesus directed the preaching of the gospel by His disciples without any information about how they must do so in the rest of the New Testament (Matt. 28:19-20; Mark 16:15-16). They could travel by whatever means available to them, or write instructional messages as they did in the various books of the New Testament; and we can utilize radio, television, tracts, workbooks, or videos in our age.

It should be clear that such videos are right in themselves, being generically authorized because they are expedients in a local church's work of teaching the lost. Our question focuses on the use of the instrumental background when someone is speaking concerning the congregation. There again, the Bible is not specific on what might be happening in the background while a preacher or an elder does some brief teaching; but there are some principles we should remember.

The background sound (something like elevator music) or picture (as in a baptistery scene, which used to be common in church houses) is not what is being taught or encouraged; but it might distract from what is being taught. I once preached in a meeting in an American Legion Hall, where dances were held on Saturday night, leaving the smell of

alcohol in the large room where we met. There was also an American flag standing at the front of the room near the speaker's stand and the Lord's table. Was it wrong to leave the flag or the smell there? What if a video were made of the worship service for display on a website and the flag was showing in the video? You see that not only sounds but also visual images must be considered? I doubt that it was wrong to leave the flag in its place, and I am sure that little could be done to remove the smell in the little time available after Saturday night. If the flag became a distraction from worship, it could be removed; but no sin was committed in leaving it there. If a video of worship included the flag, was a sin thereby committed? Is the instrumental music playing wrong? I doubt it, but I would not include it because of another factor to be discussed later.


Please consider the following questions:

- 1. If a similar video showed people gathering at the building for worship, with some community visitors wearing immodest clothing, would it be wrong to show their presence?
- 2. If the video included an instrumental version with words of "Jesus Loves Me" playing in the background, would it be right to use it on the website?
- 3. If the video showed children playing in the yard after service while parents visited, would that be wrong? We must use some wisdom in reaching conclusions about such matters.

Items (1) and (2) include things wrong in themselves, whereas item (3) includes items right in themselves. It should be obvious which ought to be included and which omitted.

Some matters not sinful in themselves are unwise and should not be done for the sake of influence on others. In my judgment, the use of an instrumental tune is not wrong per se but unwise, because it might make teaching people truth about instrumental music in worship more difficult. On the other hand, some might conclude otherwise. Matters of judgment are matters on which Christians might disagree without wrong being involved. Let each one be fully convinced in his own mind, and let no one try to make a matter of judgment into a matter of divine law (Rom. 14:5, 23). When a congregational matter is involved (as with a website), brethren should attempt to resolve issues in a way that respects the conscience of all in the congregation (Rom. 14:13).

Judgment in a case of expediency is more important than many people think (1 Cor. 8:1, 7, 9; 10:23). Poor judgment can muddy the water by introducing unneeded matters so that clear thinking and proper conclusions are more difficult. Unwise actions can cause souls to be lost. As an example, some proponents of instrumental music in worship, who were discussing the issue with a brother in Christ, backed off because they learned of a Christian using a denominational building for a wedding to use their instruments. They thought the opponent of instruments, in this case, inconsistent and possibly even hypocritical. On the other hand, wise judgment will make sacrifices by foregoing one's liberties for the sake of souls. Paul surely meant something like this in Romans 14:15-16, which says, "If your brother is made to stumble because of your food, you are no longer walking in love. Do not destroy with your food the one for whom Christ died. Therefore do not let your good be evil spoken of."



The Philistines Were Originally Greek—Just Look at Goliath

Luke examines historical information about the Philistines and suggests they share many similarities with the ancient Greeks.

The Philistines are famous biblical bad guys. Though they dwelt alongside Judah and Dan in southwestern Canaan, there is no specific account of their interactions with Israel until Samson's time. Why are they relative latecomers in the Bible?

From archaeological records, it appears the Philistines were originally among an immigrant coalition from the north that invaded Egypt in 1208 BC during the reign of Merneptah and again around 1180 BC in the time of Ramses III. Egypt defeated both invasions, and Ramses III posted victory inscriptions in his mortuary temple of Medinet Habu. Ramses III allowed the survivors to settle in Canaan, where they carved out territory and became the biblical Philistines.

The Egyptians identified the attackers with names such as the Peleset, Tjekker, and Shekelesh. Can we connect any of these with the Philistines? Look carefully, and we see the consonants of Peleset match closely with those of Philistine. From this, it seems the Peleset name was generically applied to the immigrant groups that settled in Canaan. Interestingly, the Bible labels a subgroup of Philistines that joined with David as the Pelethites (just one lightlymodified consonant from Peleset) in 2 Samuel 8:18, 15:18, 20:7, 1 Kings 1:38-44, and 1 Chronicles 18:17.

What does the Bible say about Philistine origins? Two Old Testament

prophets say they came from a place called "Caphtor," which is generally believed to be Crete or nearby Greek islands in the Aegean Sea.

Did I not bring up Israel from the land of Egypt, and the Philistines from Caphtor? (Amos 9:7, ESV).

...The fathers look not back to their children, so feeble are their hands, because of the day that is coming to destroy all the Philistines... For the LORD is destroying the Philistines, the remnant of the coastland of Caphtor (Jer. 47:3-4).

David and Goliath, the most famous of Philistine stories, contains hints of the Philistines' Greek/Aegean origins. The description of Goliath's armor and weaponry resembles that of


Greek soldiers in the Late Bronze Age, just before the invasions of Egypt.

(Goliath) had a helmet of bronze on his head, and he was armed with a coat of mail, and the weight of the coat was five thousand shekels (ca. 125 lbs.) of bronze. And he had bronze armor on his legs, and a javelin of bronze slung between his shoulders. The shaft of his spear was like a weaver's beam, and his spear's head weighed six hundred shekels (ca. 15 lbs.) of iron... (1 Sam 17:5-7).

The heavyweight of Goliath's spearhead shows it was used for thrusting, like a long Greek spear, rather than throwing. Greek thrusting spears in that time were longer and heavier than the typical throwing spears of Canaan. The Hebrew

language had no vocabulary word for that kind of foreign weapon, so the Bible text described it in visual terms, "like a weaver's beam."

Goliath's challenge to a combat of champions also reflects the Philistines' Aegean origins. The *Iliad*, a Greek epic poem about the Trojan War, tells of opposing armies selecting champions for one-on-one combat, such as Hector vs. Ajax and Achilles vs. Hector. Consider Goliath's similar challenge to Saul's army:

(Goliath) stood and shouted to the ranks of Israel, "Why have you come out to draw up for battle? ... Choose a man for yourselves, and let him come down to me. If he is able to fight with me and kill me, then we will be your servants. But if I prevail against him and kill him, then you shall be our servants and serve us ... Give me a man, that we may fight together" (1 Sam. 17:8-10).

This atypical style of combat played a part in unnerving Saul and the Israelites. David's faith is all the more remarkable since it overcame not only Goliath's size and experience but unfamiliar weaponry and a strange approach to warfare.

Though we remember the Philistines as enemies, we see in them the shadows of God's unifying power. Some of the

Cherethites, another sub-group*, joined Pelethites in allying with David. (2 Sam 15:18, et al.) Even before the gospel, people of faith were able to bring Gentiles to the knowledge of God.

* For identifying Cherethites with Philistines, note Ezekiel 25:16 and Zephaniah 2:5.



Helping Us Be True

Mark explains how, "Taking His hand, helping each other home," sets forth the guiding principles of our efforts with *Truth Magazine* and for the entire Truth Publications organization.

We are devoting the theme section of the May issue of *Truth Magazine* to a presentation of the motto, "Taking His hand, helping each other home." This is highlighted on our newly redesigned website, and the *2019 Truth Lectures* are built around the same theme.

As editor, I have been assigned the duty by the Board of Truth Publications, Inc. of selecting themes and assigning articles, sorting through the various unsolicited manuscripts, and selecting articles that will be useful to brethren, etc. We offer a curated collection of articles, usually grouped around a theme, although some issues provide assorted content that we trust will be edifying to our readers.

In the two years that I have been serving in this capacity, I have declined to print several submissions because they did not fit with our purpose or our guiding principles. Some articles have been speculative and not based on Scripture. Some were too harsh and dogmatic. In some cases, authors have advocated biblical or doctrinal error.

Our goal is to be biblically balanced and to present the whole counsel of God. Our task is to "preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort, with great patience and instruction" (2 Tim. 4:2). Please see my editorial in this issue of *Truth Magazine* for a detailed discussion of Paul's charge to Timothy. I view my editorial responsibilities as complementary to my work as an

evangelist and the service that I render as an elder in the Alvin congregation.

Our approach at Truth Publications can be summed up in the simple statement, "Taking His hand, helping each other home." Starting with a respect for God's authority, we must take His hand—He is our Guide and our Captain. Relying upon the Sacred Scriptures, we seek to help each other to be all that we should be in (1) our physical homes, and (2) our spiritual home, the church, so that (3) we can reach our eternal home in heaven. These are my guiding principles.

Our primary purpose is to promote biblical truth. Helping Us Grow

Focusing on the importance of Bible study and the need to grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord, Dan relates how Truth Publications is dedicated to producing reliable Bible study materials that help us grow closer to God.

"Grow or Die" is a theory of transformation in the business world which has become a cornerstone in strategic planning and organizational transformation of corporations. Dr. George Land applied this idea to organizations, which was already widely recognized in the area of physical, chemical, psychological and cultural processes. His important 1973 book bore this title. The point of his hypothesis is simple: either an organization is on a path to growth, or it is on a path toward decline—one or the other. This perspective makes perfect sense, and the conclusion he draws from it is inarguable. Companies are either growing or they are dying.

Nevertheless, this concept has larger implications than that which relates to corporations and companies. It is applicable to churches as institutions and individual congregations as well. It also applies to individuals. Ask yourself the following question: Spiritually speaking, are you growing or dying? As a Christian are you growing stronger and better, or no? It is one or the other. It cannot be both. We are growing in our walk with God. and learning more about Jesus and his will for us, or else we are losing ground. This is a hard reality to face, but the "grow or die" principle is universally applicable. It applies to you. It applies to me. It has application to the church with which you worship; it is either gaining ground or losing it.

God wants us to grow. That is selfevident. The word of God has many reminders to this effect, and most of us know them very well. Some of us can quote them off-hand without too much thought. Let us take a moment to remind ourselves of a few of them. For example, Paul said to Timothy:

Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth (2 Tim. 2:15 ESV).

The Lord's faithful people are commanded to grow:

Speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, even Christ (Eph. 4:15).

Like small children, growing and developing, we are to develop into the full-grown, mature Christians that God would have us to be:

...as newborn babes, long for the spiritual milk which is without guile, that you may grow thereby unto salvation (1 Pet. 2:2).

It should be our aim to grow in both grace and knowledge, through the study of God's inspired Word and through spiritual exercise, making application of the principles we learn:

But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and for ever. Amen. (2 Pet. 3:18).

Those of us who work with Truth Publications/CEI Bookstore are all about the process of furthering the growth of congregations and individual Christians. The local church is God's chosen environment for the

cultivation of spirituality and Christian maturation (Eph. 3:10). To this end, tools are needed, such as Bibles and books. The work of the church is outlined in Ephesians 4:12 as being for "the perfecting of the saints... the work of ministering... (and the) building up of the body of Christ."

While printing and publishing is not part of this effort, printed books and materials are helpful aids in these works, making them function with greater efficiency and ease. I try to smooth out wording where it may be overly complicated, to reduce redundancy or repetitive language that often occurs. As a preacher and Bible student, I own hundreds of good books on biblical subject matter. Besides the Bible itself, they represent my most important physical asset as a gospel preacher and teacher of the Word. Paul felt the same way. His traveling library was separated from him for a short period, and he thus asked Timothy to bring those books and parchments to him when he came his way (2 Tim. 4:13). All of us ought to own a library of some kind, however small it might be.

3. An Inventory of Over 800 Titles. Since this company (in its various

manifestations) has been in business for over sixty years, we have a deep well of existing books, booklets, pamphlets, and tracts from which to draw as we make available to our readership materials that will be helpful and encouraging for them. Many competitors have come and gone, but we have persisted in business and continued to serve brethren and congregations with material that is both scriptural and beneficial. We also evaluate new manuscripts that are sent our way for potential publication. We are on the lookout for newer authors among faithful brethren who have produced good Bible study material that is (1) faithful to the biblical pattern, and is (2) designed to challenge readers and contribute to their spiritual growth.

Any writer who is a Christian is welcome to call any one of us and send a completed manuscript for consideration. We would love to help if we can.

Kyle Pope offers the following comments regarding the work that he does and that we are currently doing together as a team:

This work involves not only layout and design, but reading and editing. This is an invaluable aid in my own preaching. While I can offer some assistance in guaranteeing the soundness of material that is published, I gain so much in the process as I feed upon the rich teaching good brothers and sisters in Christ have put in print. In this regard, it is humbling to recognize the role we can play in helping the gospel spread through the materials we provide to Christians the world over, but it is also exciting to consider the impact the efforts we make can have on generations to come. Our lives are limited, but the written word can live when our brief lives have passed.

As I write these words I have a hand in many such good works. Two workbooks in the *Bible Text* Book series will soon be updated. He has requested a few maps for the book, which I will complete as I do the final editing and layout to get it in print very soon. Several books, utilizing articles from *Truth Magazine* on various topics such as evidences. authority, and leaving a spiritual legacy, are also on the schedule. Helping Us Serve

Noting the importance of serving one another as individuals, in the home and the church, Lance and Gary explain how the CEI Bookstore team is dedicated to serving our customers.

(Matt. 20:28). Paul referred to himself as a servant—including to Titus (1:1) and to the church in Corinth (1 Cor. 9:19). He implied the same to Timothy (2 Tim. 2:24) by describing a servant of the Lord as "gentle" (v. 24), "patient" (v. 24), and showing "humility" (v. 25). Similar terms were implied by our Lord in Matthew 20:25-27.

Although the first century definition of a servant was more aligned to a slave or bondservant, the modern definition is not dissimilar: i.e., one who serves another. In the context of our Lord's church, a servant has always been one who does His will by putting the needs of others ahead of his own. It is this very "heart of a servant" that should be developed as early as possible.

The desire to serve others in this manner is not a genetically inherent character trait. Rather it is an intentionally learned and developed behavior. It can and should start at

an early age. We often consider the example of Timothy's early exposure to God's word from his mother Eunice and grandmother Lois (2 Tim. 1:5). Christian parents and grandparents providing homes where the Bible is taught regularly is a solid foundation from which to encourage and prepare youth to be Godly servants. These adult Christians should strive to exemplify service in their daily actions both to each other as well as those outside their families, explaining why they're doing so and allowing the children to participate as well. Leaders of the Lord's churches should provide both instruction on this subject as well as create age-appropriate and scriptural opportunities for all to provide service within and without the church, Fellow Christians should exhort one another to service.



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

Consider the impact of the printing press (Gutenberg's Bible, etc.), camp meetings in frontier days, tent meetings in the early and mid-20th century, the widespread use of mass media: newspapers. radio and television, and now, the internet (email, blogs, websites, social media, etc.). Truth Publications is using the latest technologies (printon-demand, digital distribution. our various websites, etc.) to put reliable study materials in the hands of Bible students around the world.

Phillip Stuckey Observes:

Jesus calls on His disciples to "Go into all the world" and make more disciples (Matt. 28:18-20). Today, with the internet and the proliferation of the vast amount of information that is available to people, Christians have a great opportunity to reach people all over the world with an ease unknown in previous generations. It is estimated that over four billion people use the internet worldwide today and that number will continue to grow. How many of these people have never heard the gospel? How many of these people live in areas that could use good Bible study material but have limited access to it?

Corey Willis Concludes:

Although technology research and development (R&D) projects might be pursued for no other reason than to determine what's possible, that's a horrible reason to implement new technologies in an organization. Technology must be used to accomplish an objective or fulfill a larger mission. It's no surprise, then, that Christianity has consistently leveraged new and emerging technologies. What is more important than the divine

mission of teaching the gospel to reach the lost or edify the church?

When radio was an emerging technology in America during the early 1920s, it was quickly assessed as a wonderful medium for broadcasting the gospel. In the early 1920s, only a few "engineers and tinkering boys" owned radios, but by 1922 Chicago heard their first gospel message broadcast from the station on the roof of City Hall (Rogers, 2010). By 1931, when over half of the homes in America owned a radio, the word of God was a staple of the medium. We see the same pattern in the 1990s during the early days of the internet. "Just as the printing press was lauded by Protestant Christians as a revolutionary tool for spreading the gospel in the vernacular of the common people of Europe, a new generation has come forth and embraced the internet for the task of spreading Christian beliefs" (Campbell, 2010).

Conversations and studies of important Bible questions were formerly facilitated in printed publications. They provided a forum for these discussions long before the advent of the world wide web. Thankfully, many of these publications have been preserved on the internet and are more accessible than ever before. I've prepared for very few sermons or classes without researching these archives. Truth Publications

continues to pursue its missions today by leveraging technologies to fulfill orders online, distribute books and materials digitally, and utilize print-on-demand services to rapidly address needs and minimize the capital required for printed publications. Regardless of the medium through which we preach and teach, the content of the gospel is the critical focus of these efforts.

Helping Us Worship

by Steve Wolfgang

Worship includes observing the Lord's supper and laying by in store on the first day of the week, along with scriptural preaching, prayer, and praise. In this regard, Steve shares the benefits of *Psalms*, *Hymns and Spiritual Songs*.

As a non-profit religious publishing organization, our mission is to produce and distribute a wide variety of material intended to help Christians (1) grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord, (2) edify one another as we worship together in local congregations, and (3) share the good news of God's grace, i.e., the forgiveness of sins through Jesus Christ, and the hope of eternal life. The materials we produce and publish include an innovative full commentary on the entire Bible, several complete sets of Bible class curricula, a wide variety of tracts and other Bible study materials. Several years ago, we also underwrote the production of the new hymnal, Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs.

The worship of Almighty God is the most important thing that Christians do. While it is true that a single Christian can certainly worship God individually, and worship should not be confined only to what happens within the four walls of a building (Rom. 12:2), there is a special sense in which Christians are acting together congregationally, and worshipping collectively. It is also true that, in some ways, what a Christian does in any aspect of life should glorify God and constitute worship. What we do together as Christians in acts of worship specified in the New Testament is quite distinct from "glorifying God" by mowing the yard of an elderly Christian or washing a neighbor's car as an act of service.

Christians gather on the Lord's day, just as early disciples did from the beginning of the New Testament church. They do so in order to (1) commune in the Lord's supper, (2) offer prayers to our heavenly Father, (3) diligently study the written revelation of God, and (4) give of their earthly finances so that (a) the gospel may be spread, (b) other Christians may be edified, and (c) scriptural benevolent works may be accomplished. These all constitute acts of worship as exemplified and commanded in the New Testament.

Additionally, we may worship, either individually or in concert with other Christians, in singing hymns of praise to God. To that end, we published a collection of *Psalms*, *Hymns*, *and Spiritual Songs* (often abbreviated *PHaSS*) in 2012. As one of the editors, I have been asked to highlight its features as one means of what we are trying to do in "Taking His hand, helping each other home."

The content of this hymnal began with a selection of 550 hymns, identified through an internet survey in which participants ranked those hymns most appropriate for a congregational hymnal. These 550 hymns were identified as familiar and widely used by many Christians, and thus represent a core "repertoire" in many churches. They were selected, identified, and highly ranked by Christians across the country from the more than 1800 hymns which

appeared in at least one of the eight hymnals most widely used by Churches of Christ in the 20th century. Thus, more than 1200 hymns, including some "personal favorites" as well as hymns well-known in some localities, were not included since they were not highly ranked by those investing the time to participate in the internet survey.

To this core of 550 familiar hymns, 300 titles were added from various genre (including gospel, contemporary, folk, New English Renaissance, and high church hymns) appropriate for congregational worship. These 300 titles also included hymns written by brethren in recent decades, which were "blind-reviewed" based on content, poetic and musical quality and potential for use in congregations wishing to learn new hymns. Thus the content of PHaSS includes 850 hymns that are both old and new, representing a variety of musical and poetic styles. As a collection, they reflect an emphasis on quality and suitability for congregational worship rather than being skewed toward any particular favorite genre or personal preference.

Phrased Notation

Of the many distinctive features in *PHaSS*, perhaps the most noticeable is the concept of "Phrased Notation." This unique feature sets the width of a hymn by the length of phrases that fit on a line, rather than by the musical notation. Phrased Notation then "wraps" the music around those phrases. The result is a series

of unbroken clauses and couplets, as in a book of poetry. These unbroken phrases let the worshiper visualize, group, and more easily comprehend the meaning of the phrases as they are being sung. Phrased Notation has proven to be effective in promoting the comprehension of uninterrupted thoughts within a hymn.

The layout of hymns, centered on each page, causes them to appear in various widths in Phrased Notation. Hymns with longer phrases will occupy the full width of the page. Other hymns with varying meters will appear as "narrow" hymns with significant white space surrounding them. In some hymns, the meter demands different staff widths within the same hymn. To help orient how the eye "sees" each hymn, titles of each hymn (also of varying length) appear with spanners which run the full width of each page.

Content Sequence

The first section of *Psalms*, *Hymns*, and *Spiritual Songs* contains psalms and psalm derivatives. A second section contains hymns and spiritual songs. This section is ordered in a God-first sequence, beginning with hymns of praise, followed by hymns about the life of Christ, continuing with hymns addressing themes such as salvation, fellowship, submission, commitment, the Christian life, prayer, evangelism, heaven, and eventually concluding with songs of invitation.

Editorial Principles and Processes

Each hymn was systematically and thoroughly reviewed in terms of word choice and verse selection. With few exceptions, hymns familiar to the primary audience of this hymnal were published in the most common version, as determined by its appearance in the hymnals most frequently used among Churches of Christ in recent generations. This editorial policy gave greatest emphasis to language that was biblical, poetic,

and original or standard, while giving lesser emphasis to language that privileges momentary trends or accommodates transient fashions.

In unfamiliar hymns or those using archaic language, the lyrics were modernized when possible. Yet, in more familiar hymns, the wording remains unchanged. Unfamiliar hymns with problematic verses were occasionally "hybridized" using superior couplets or quatrains from existing phrases within the hymn. On rare occasions, one or two words in familiar hymns were altered to achieve consistent meter or to prevent worshipers from stumbling over inconsistent phrasing, by eliminating the need to frequently double-check the hymn page for unpredictable terms or rhythms.

A number of outstanding hymns, widely known and frequently sung by prior generations of Christians, have dropped out of the repertoire of modern hymnals but are reintroduced in PHaSS. In some hymns, excellent original verses have likewise disappeared from hymnals over time, but are incorporated in this hymnal. The criteria necessary for reintroduction were biblical expression, worthy content, and poetic quality. Also, several hymns in PHaSS contain optional verses. These verses, appearing below the staff, are borrowed from other hymns with a similar message and meter. They demonstrate how optional verses can extend a hymn while giving the borrowed verse a fresh use.

Other Distinctive Features

All hymns and tunes in *Psalms*, *Hymns*, *and Spiritual Songs* were copyedited to fit a style sheet. The hymn style sheet was developed according to Standard English. One of the most distinctive features of this hymnal is that the word "Lord" appears in small caps as "LORD" when it refers to YHWH, as in some Bibles. The variable capitalization of "Lord" and "LORD" allows this hymnal to serve

as a teaching tool, helping worshipers to sing with a clearer understanding.

Additionally, there are various "composite" hymns included as a distinctive feature of *Psalms*, *Hymns*, and Spiritual Songs. These hymns contain verses from other well-known hymns sharing the same message and meter. These composite hymns address topics of salvation, pilgrimage, spiritual warfare, heaven, as well as the crucifixion and kingship of Christ. Most of these composite hymns introduce new or underutilized music appropriate to these very familiar verses. For Christians and congregations interested in learning the new music, these composite hymns can revitalize older verses and provide an uncomplicated and spiritually edifying medley-like worship experience.

In addition to unique features such as Phrased Notation, capitalizations of Lord and LORD, composite hymns, hybridized verses, and optional verses, other distinctive aspects of this hymnal include dagger endnotes and a hymn-based metrical index, and several additional features.

It is our fervent desire that worship leaders will make full use of this hymnal, exercising good judgment throughout. Worship leaders have great discretion in selecting the ideal tempo, volume, and other aspects of worship in song. Worship leaders may use the topical index to develop themed services, the metrical index to match hymns with various tunes, and the endnotes to consider alternative keys and arrangements. We have provided these tools with the trust and confidence that dedicated and thoughtful worship leaders will use them judiciously.

refers to "(1) a state of remaining tranquil while awaiting an outcome, patience, steadfastness, endurance; (2) a state of being able to bear up under provocation, forbearance, patience toward others" (BDAG).

This quality is very important. God demonstrates longsuffering toward us (Rom. 2:4; 1 Tim. 1:16; 2 Pet. 3:15). We should manifest the same spirit toward others (Gal. 5:22; Eph. 4:1-3; Col. 3:11-12).

And Instruction

Doctrine (KJV); teaching (NKJV, ASV); instruction (NASB); in teaching (RSV & ESV); with all the patience that the work of teaching requires (NEB). The Greek word *didachē*, rendered "instruction," refers to either "(1) the activity of teaching," or "(2) the content of teaching" (BDAG).

Biblical doctrine is from above (John 7:16). The early disciples "continued steadfastly in the apostles" doctrine" (Acts 2:42). We must abide in the doctrine of

Christ, or suffer the consequences of spiritual alienation (2 John 1:9).

Conclusion

In charging Timothy, Paul discusses the duty of preachers and infers the duty of hearers (2 Tim. 4:1-5). May we faithfully proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. Like Timothy, let us fulfill our ministry, preaching the word, being ready in season and out of season—reproving, rebuking, and exhorting in a scriptural manner, i.e., with great patience and instruction. Let us teach sound doctrine and biblical truth, not myths, seeking God's favor, not man's approval.

Denominations that are trying to revive their flagging fortunes, and some brethren who have adopted the approach of community churches, present an unswervingly positive message. They stress self-realization over redemption, self-help rather than self-sacrifice, self-fulfillment instead of self-denial. They accentuate

atmospherics, depreciating doctrine and emphasizing emotion.

In contrast, may we recognize two simple truths: Pleasing men and pleasing God are mutually incompatible goals (Gal. 1:10; 1 Thess. 2:3-4). Genuine growth occurs when we speak the truth in love, and each member does his part (Eph. 4:11-16).
